Exploring Careers in the Manufacturing Industry

The Program

The "Ready to Work"

Manufacturing Boot Camp is a oneweek training program for
graduating high school seniors.

It provides students an opportunity to explore careers in the manufacturing industry as an alternative to college or a university after graduation.

Fun Fact: Over the next decade, 4.6 million manufacturing jobs will need to be filled in the U.S.

This is a privately-funded program, and any high school senior in Indian River County is eligible to apply.

Students are referred to the program by their school's Graduation Counselor.

There is no charge to participate. Any special equipment or safety attire will be provided to each student as needed, plus all students will receive Boot Camp t-shirts.

Transportation to and from the manufacturing locations, and lunch, are also provided each day.



Program Details

The Boot Camp will focus on three key areas:

- Overview of the manufacturing industry
- Soft Skills and Workforce Readiness
- · Team Building

Each day, students are transported to a manufacturer's facility, spending time on the shop floor, interacting with employees and learning about the skill sets needed for the various positions.

At the end of each day, a "hands-on" session will be held at the Career & Tech Center.

- ➤ The Boot Camp is scheduled for: May 20-24, 2019, 8:00a-4p daily
- ➤ Students will be picked up and dropped off at the Career & Technical Education Center: 4680 28th Court, Gifford
- ➤ Students are expected to arrive on-time, wearing appropriate clothes and footwear no shorts, flip-flops, or sandals; tennis shoes are allowed

History – Early Results

The Indian River County
Manufacturing Boot Camp program
is based on the successful program
in St. Lucie County.

Employers in our region are concerned about a growing Skills Gap in our workforce. To address this challenge, programs are being developed to focus on training and building a "pipeline" of future workers — that could be you!

In 2017, the first Manufacturing Boot camp was launched in St. Lucie County, with 21 high school seniors and five local companies.

Common themes during the students' week-long training included:

- ✓ Corporate culture
- ✓ How to be a good employee
- Resume writing and interviewing
- ✓ Financial literacy (what to do with your paychecks)

At the end of the week, a Signing Day was held with employers, and nearly half the students were offered jobs!

PORT ST. LUCIE — Student athletes have signing days. Now St. Lucie County students seeking careers in manufacturing, trade and distribution have one too.

On June 15, 22 recent graduates of St. Lucie

Public Schools will celebrate their completion of the county's first Ready to Work Manufacturing Boot Camp with an opportunity to sign on as employees with local manufacturing, trade and distribution companies.

The students, 21 young men and one young woman, graduates of Fort Pierce Central, Centennial, Lincoln Park Academy, Port St. Lucie and Treasure Coast high schools, will be attending a five-day boot camp designed to prepare them for immediate, high-demand careers.

The June 11-15 boot camp will cover the manufacturing process, quality assurance, assembly and packaging, warehousing, distribution, safety and more.

The students will also receive a resume review, brush up on interview skills and learn about personal finance.

In addition to classroom studies, the boot camp includes instructional field trips to Silver-Line Plastics, Southern Eagle Distributing, Hi-Tide Boat Lifts, Phoenix Metal Products, Walmart Distribution Center, and Pursuit Boats.

"I have a job now where I make \$8.30 an hour. I see this as my chance; nowadays we don't usually get a chance," said Wichla Jules, 19.

Jules graduated from Fort Pierce Central last month and was encouraged to apply for the boot camp by her counselor, whom she said was really excited about the program.

The students for this inaugural program were hand-selected by their guidance counselors.

"A lot of these kids have technical skills already but are not sure how to put them to use to maximize their career options and income potential. The boot camp and signing day will give these kids an opportunity to soar," said Kim M. Johnson, M.Ed, NCC, guidance counselor at Fort Pierce Central High School. "When I told them about the program, some of the kids' faces just lit up. I don't always get students to return forms, but they sure did for this!"

"This program is hands-on and interactive. Its focus is to assist students in developing a base knowledge of local industries, available opportunities and the soft skills necessary to forge successful career pathways with local companies that are hiring today," said Jill Marasa, vice president of the Economic Development Council of St. Lucie County (EDC).

The Signing Day event will be held at 11 a.m., Friday, June 15 at the Enterprise Hub at Indian River State College's St. Lucie West Campus, Building F, 500 N.W. California Boulevard, Port St. Lucie.
